The "lovely" month of February has come to an end. It has been such an exciting month! Our new addition, Garron, fits right in. We are thrilled with how quickly everyone has adapted to the new atmosphere of our room. Along with adding Garron to the bunch, we have seen many of our babies enter into the beginning stages of crawling, as well as being introduced to baby food. From a little 'hi" or "hey" to "Dada" or "Mama", we have also noticed that a few of our babies have started communicating with a little bit of verbal language and body language (waving, peek-a-boo, etc.). We have a little bunch of go-getters!

While we haven't seen any of our younger babies pick up much sign language yet, we are still watching intently for it. The most common age for babies to start picking up sign language is between 8 and 12 months of age; however, this does vary from each individual child. So don't worry! If we see your child start using a sign we will make sure to let you know.

We are looking forward to Spring and some warmer weather! Once spring arrives, our babies will be the perfect age to start enjoying more time outside. We look forward to many new and fun experiences that we will encounter out on the playground.

Please refer to the chart below to see any upcoming milestones that your child may be nearing. Remember, there IS a wide age range of time that these can be reached. What's Happening in Mom's Day Out?

We had lots of fun with the color red in February. We painted and used stickers and markers. You will notice soon that the red art will come down, and green will be our focus in March.

Our Montessori time has increased as the weather has kept us inside. We work with the children to become aware of the Montessori Method of choosing work, taking it to the table, and then returning to the shelf when completed. This is very different from the "dump and play" method that all children start with. Therefore, we wait until the child is a little older before introducing him/her to Montessori. The readiness skills we are looking for are: being able to stay with an activity for a longer period of time, understanding and following simple verbal directions, and no longer putting things in his/ her mouth. On average, we notice readiness around 18 months, but it can be different for everyone.

We are saying goodbye to Blake this month, who is moving over to the Toddler classroom. We will miss him, but know he'll have fun playing with his buddies that have already moved over there. We would like to welcome Abhigna to our classroom.

Intellectual Development 8 - 14 Months

Here are some examples of what your baby should be doing that shows how the wheels are turning in their little heads:

Explore his environment because he is very curious.

Closely examine small objects and details.

Experiment with objects and gadgets to discover the consequences of his actions.

Repeat acts which have previously produced interesting effects.

Remember the location of toys she has hidden, and look for objects that are taken from her.

Place a round shape into a shape sorter.

Intellectual Development 14 - 24 Months

Use trial and error to figure out simple problems such as fitting a shape into a shape sorter.

Take things apart and try to put them back together again.

Overcome simple obstacles, such as reaching a high object by climbing on to a chair.

Stay with one activity for a short amount of time.

Know sounds that some animals make.

Continue to be curious about his surroundings.

Become more interested in exploring new environments.

Notice tiny, detailed objects.

Wow! I can't believe it is already March! It seems our year is going by faster and faster! We have been very busy in our classroom exploring the many new works, and creating wonderful pieces of art to decorate our classroom. I am excited to say that about half of our class is potty trained or potty training! I know this can be a frustrating time for parents, especially when there are accidents. Please remember that accidents will happen and that it is okay. It is important for you to stay calm and support your child through this process, and try not to get discouraged when they make a mistake. Also, be prepared. This means packing extra clothes for school (including socks) and for in the car in case of accidents while you are out and about.

We have changed our works on our shelves, which is always an exciting time for the children. They really enjoy discovering new things! One of the many favorite works on our practical life shelf is vegetable cutting. The children are able to "cut" different vegetables with a knife. The vegetables are put together with Velcro and when the child uses the knife they can "cut" through the Velcro separating the parts of the vegetables. Another work is the Community worker matching. In this work, the child must match the community worker with the appropriate tool. The firefighter matches with the firefighter hat, and the mail carrier matches with the mailbox. We have also been practicing our counting skills. We frequently count to 20 or higher!

We are so excited to be able to use our playground and enjoy the fresh air! Although we have had some very mild days, please continue to keep a set of mittens and a hat at school for your child. We try to go outside as much as possible. When we go outside, we like to say a poem before crossing the parking lot. You may have heard your child saying this when you are crossing the parking lot or street. It goes as follows:

Look left, look right No cars in sight Safe to walk.

We also stress walking in the parking lot instead of running.

Here are the songs we will be learning this month during circle time:

Wind.Wind (row, row, row your boat)

Wind, wind, blow the clouds Fast across the sky. Blow the branches back and forth In the trees so high

Colors in the Air

March is here! Thank you to all of the mom's who joined us for Muffins With Mom! Also, don't forget Spring Break is from March 15th- 22rd (school will resume on March 25th).

We are missing a lot of our spare clothes that were given out to children who had accidents and needed to borrow our clothes. If you have any of our clothing at home, it would be greatly appreciated if they were returned as soon as possible. They are marked CMS on the tags. Also, we are running low on girl and boy pants, if you have any that you would like to donate to the school that would help us out a lot!

I would like to remind parents of our pick up times at 11:30, 12:30, 3:30 and 5:30. (Please be on time) If you would like to speak with a teacher about any information, please arrive a little earlier so it gives the staff time to talk with you. It is important to know that we have staff that are "off the clock" at 12:30, 3:30 and 5:30 who sometimes have an appointment to get to and would like to leave on time. Thank you for your understanding in this matter.

In March we will be moving into Europe. The children will be learning about some of the countries in Europe, as well as their culture, monuments, food and the animals that live there. The children will have an opportunity to prick out the continent of Europe to add to their world map. The children will make some flags and visually see artifacts brought back from places in Europe. In language we will also learn more sight words and work with simple association.

In the practical life room, the children will be pricking out shamrocks and coloring them too. The material is getting harder as the year goes on, and the children are practicing with the material very nicely. The easel will change back to painting from the chalk board. We have shamrock mosaics the children can make during work time, along with shamrock cookie cutters for play dough.

In the sensorial area, the children love to touch. The child learns what an object is with the use of their hands. A child can be blind fold and this eliminates of visual recognition, this will challenge child to recognize something with their fingers.

In the Montessori classroom the child is given tactile activities with the objects bag. This bag will contain a collection of objects such as a cup, dice, pencil, string, eraser, spoon, bell, and ball. The child will grasp the objects and names it without looking at it.

A parallel exercise for educating the tactile sense is a box containing many pairs of swatches of different materials such as wool, flannel, silk, cotton, velvet, canvas, lace, etc. In the exercise the child mixes all the swatches, puts on a blindfold and then identifies the pairs by feeling them. The child can correct the exercise himself by removing the blindfold and looking to see if the pairs match. During this exercise the child learns correct names of the materials, thus giving the child an opportunity to increase their vocabulary during the years when the child is especially sensitive to language development.

In the math area, the Gold bead Material, designed by Dr. Montessori, is used to demonstrate the decimal system. The single bead on the right represents a Unit. The bar made up of 10 units in a row represents a Ten. Ten of the Ten Bars fastened tighter to form a square represent a Hundred, and a pile of 10 Hundred Squares forms the cube on the left which represents a Thousand. The children already know the terms square and cube from their work with the geometric materials.

The teacher explains to the children that to count large quantities of units is awkward and time consuming. Therefore, whenever they have 10 Units they change them for a Ten Bar. When they have 10 Ten Bars they replace them with a Hundred Square, and whenever they have 10 Hundred squares they change them for a Thousand Cube. The numeral cards are printed in different colors to indicate the columns of the decimal system. The Units are printed in green, the Tens in blue, the Hundreds in red, and the Thousands in green again.
